



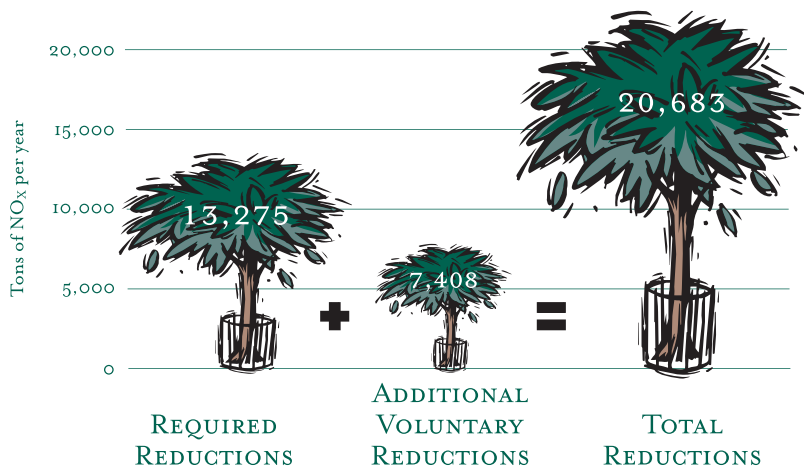
CORPORATE COMMITMENT

At El Paso, environmental stewardship guides operational decisions companywide. That commitment begins with the Board of Directors' Health, Safety, and Environmental committee that meets quarterly to review environmental performance, policies, and programs companywide.

Additionally, an Executive Environmental, Health, and Safety committees of senior executives establish environmental goals and plans that guide each business unit's specific operations. Business unit committees also adopt individual environmental management systems, which incorporate the company's environmental policies, processes, and procedures. The executive and business unit committees meet on a quarterly basis to review progress and take actions needed to meet our goal for continuous improvement in our environmental performance.

At every level of the company, environmental stewardship guides decisions and actions, ensuring that El Paso's commitment to environmental excellence and compliance is never compromised.

FAST FACTS

El Paso uses tools and techniques that minimize impact to the environment. For example, in environmentally sensitive areas, the company carefully selects the size and location of its drilling sites. Drilling pad sites are constructed to prevent damage to environmentally sensitive areas, and advanced horizontal drilling techniques are used to preserve sensitive areas while effectively recovering oil and natural gas beneath them.

Electric motors, fuel-efficient compressor engines, and other energy-conserving equipment and tools are used as often as possible in our operations. El Paso also supports various educational and research and development institutions that are developing ways to reduce emissions from pipeline and production facilities.

El Paso takes active steps to protect wildlife—from the butterflies of Wisconsin to the marine life in the Gulf of Mexico.

El Paso joined the EPA's Natural Gas STAR program in the mid-1990s. Also, since the company joined the STAR program, it has saved more than 26.4 billion cubic feet of natural gas—equivalent to removing 2.4 million cars from the roads.

Based on 2004 operations, El Paso eliminates more than 20,000 tons of Nitrogen Oxide emissions on an annual basis.
